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


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## from the president

A special thanks also to our sponsors Zoetis, Rural Bank and Shearwell that joined us. Members enjoyed meeting and putting names to faces of the people that support us throughout the year.

#### FEDERAL COUNCIL MOVEMENTS

The 2023 AGM saw the retirement of **Ben Prentice** from Council after one term. We thank Ben for his input in that time.

**Brad Honeysett**, Honeyoaks Stud, was elected to Federal Council for a two-year term, along with all other Councillors that were up for re-election. Brad brings passion and enthusiasm to Council with fresh ideas for Promotions and Marketing. We look forward to getting to know him and to work with him over the next few years.

Following the AGM, the Council elected it's officers for the upcoming year. #### 2023 AGM

The 2023 AGM was held at the Lake Hume Resort, Albury, NSW with provision for all members to participate online via Zoom. This has also been the case over the past few years, and the Council will review whether the AGM will be offered in an online capacity into the future.

#### **WEBMANAGER UPGRADE**

The AWSA WebManager system underwent a software upgrade earlier this year. The look of functionality of the system will appear similar to members, however the software is now much newer and will enable the system to be better supported into the future.

During the upgrade, the ability for members to pay their accounts by credit card was included as an added option. Members will now see this when they checkout their shopping cart invoice, and will be able to select payment by Credit Card, EFT or Cheque.

For Credit Card payments, a new screen will open to make payment. This is powered by the secure Stripe payment gateway and will not incur additional processing fees for members.

EFT and Cheque payments can continue the same as usual, please forward remittance for all EFT payments to the Secretary at whitesuffolk@gmail.com to ensure your payment is allocated to your invoice/membership.

Soon, Stripe will be integrated into the Association's Xero accounting package also so members can also pay invoices issued through the Xero system by credit card if they wish.

#### **ANNUAL RETURNS RELEASED IN APRIL**

2023 Annual Returns were released to all members in April. Members should have received an email direct from WebManager with a notice regarding this, and a Live Summary PDF attached for their stud.

An additional email was sent from the Secretary with information on how to complete your Annual Return.

Please contact the Secretary if you are not able to find your email so it can be resent to you. Alternatively, you can login to WebManager and the Annual Return will appear in your menu to complete.

Members are reminded of the following:

- Brucellosis Accreditation details are required to be updated if your accreditation has expired. Please ensure you upload a copy of your certificate to your Stud Details, or forward a copy by text or email to the Secretary.
- If a ram or semen is missing in your rams used list due to a transfer not yet being completed, then you are able to finalise your Annual Return without it, provided you email or text the Secretary with the details of the ram that needs to be included. We will see that the ram is included once and if the transfer occurs.

Annual Return information is vetted, members have an obligation to ensure the information they are submitting in their return is true and accurate to the best of their knowledge.

Annual Returns are due by 30th April. Your prompt response is appreciated.

#### **REGISTRATIONS & TRANSFERS**

Members are reminded of their obligation to ensure all registrations and transfers are completed as soon as possible after sale. This is important as it can have an impact on the ability to complete and finalise rams used on Annual Returns if a transfer has not been processed.


- Revamp of our Newsletter with modern aspects, and looking to move to producing a digital flip-book style newsletter for our April 2023 edition.

## SHEEP & LAMB INSIGHTS - APRIL 2023

Stability is expected to characterise lamb prices in the coming month. Lamb supply has eased with average weekly slaughter in March down 2.3 per cent from February but on par with a year earlier. In addition, most sheep producing regions received decent rainfall in late-March which will help sure up autumn pastures following a dry summer. These factors contributed to the National Trade Lamb Indicator (NTLI) improving by six per cent since the middle of March. This was a welcome change following a 17 per cent fall across February and the first half of March. Prices are still relatively subdued with the NTLI 15 per cent lower than a year ago and 14 per cent below the five-year average. Further rainfall forecast for early-April should continue to offer support to prices. Supply is set to slow down further in April as public holidays reduce the number of working days for processors. Looking longer-term, lamb supply will likely increase and remain elevated through to winter. The results of Meat and Livestock Australia's producer intentions survey indicates that there are still plenty of lambs to be sold in coming month. This could mean we won't see the usual seasonal decline in supply in June and July. As a result of a flatter supply trend, the rise in prices typically seen in those months will not be as pronounced.

Another factor playing into recent lamb prices is the larger gap to mutton prices. The National Mutton Indicator (NMI) declined dramatically at the start of 2023 and has spent the last month within a range of 300-350c/kg. This places the NMI 34 per cent below the five-year average. The relatively poorer performance of mutton prices saw their discount to trade lambs grow to 51 per cent. This is much larger than the five-year average discount of 31 per cent. As a result, processors appear to be favouring mutton. This is reflected in March sheep slaughter


sitting 40 per cent higher year-on-year. The greater preference for mutton has helped stabilise mutton prices following the drop in prices in January. It has also contributed to weaker processor demand for lambs.

Elevated mutton slaughter has driven a higher volume of exports. Mutton export volumes in March were the largest since November 2019 and 68 per cent higher than a year ago. China has been the primary market absorbing the increase in mutton supply. Exports to China in March were 125 per cent higher than a year ago. Mutton exports to the Middle East have been improving since October 2022 and leapt higher in March, returning to levels not seen since March 2020.

Export demand for lamb is becoming a concern. Export volumes improved by 10.5 per cent in March but were only 2.9 per cent higher year-on-year. China was the largest market for the month. This was the first time it has held that title since May 2021. A 7.8 per cent rise for the month and an 11.3 per cent decline in exports to the US helped China overtake the US. While exports to China were 38.8 per cent higher year-on-year, exports to the US were 29.6 per cent lower. However, there are encouraging signs in smaller markets. South Korea recorded their second largest monthly volume on record and are tracking 47.1 per cent ahead of last year for the year-to-date. Exports to the UAE are also performing well, up 32.4 per cent for the year to date. Tapping into demand in these markets will be key to the direction of lamb prices amidst an apparent slowdown in demand from the US.





## WHITE SUFFOLK YOUTH A FOCUS AT 2023 NATIONAL CONFERENCE

A focus on young breeders is one of the plans for the Australian White Suffolk Association after its long-awaited national conference.

After a three-year hiatus due to COVID-19, around 100 association members, speakers, industry representatives and school student breeders from across the country descended on Albury to celebrate and plan for the popular breed's upcoming year.

The conference meant a changing of the guard for the Association, with Ian Gilmore, Baringa stud, Oberon, elected as President. Mr Gilmore took over the reins from Andrew Heinrich, Ella Matta Stud, Parndana, SA, who had the challenging role of navigating COVID during the past two years.

Peter Angus, Maroola Stud, Mallala, SA, was elected as Vice President.

A highlight for many was hearing from 20 school students from Yanco Agricultural High School and St Paul's College who run their own White Suffolk studs.

The students play a huge role in ram selection, mating choices, undertaking artificial insemination (AI), lamb marking, attending shows and exhibiting, marketing and selling their stud rams.

This was a highlight for conference convenor Paul Routley.

The Almondvale stud principal said the mix of breeders, from older stud producers who had bred White Suffolks for decades to young people just getting started, was fantastic.

He said the Association was keen to support school initiatives.

"The students were ecstatic with how they were received," he said.











"The Association takes great pride in the youth and nurturing them - they are the future breeders."

He said having major sponsors Zoetis and Rural Bank at the conference, as well as conference sponsors MLA, Alltech Lienert, Elders and Nutrien, was a big benefit.

He said animal health and nutrition was a focus, with Dr Matthew Playford from Zoetis and Matthew Hallam from Nutrien presenting.

Dean Bellingham, Shearwell Data, presented on electronic NLIS tagging as NSW and SA look to roll out mandatory eID tagging.

"It gave us the whole perspective of the industry," he said.

Another highlight was guest speaker Kerry O'Keeffe, former Australian cricketer and current cricket commentator for Fox Sports, who shared his favourite moments in his career.

Incoming President Mr Gilmore said the Association was keen to promote White Suffolks even more.

"The White Suffolk has versatility, whether it is as terminal or maternal sires," he said.

He said the conference was a great opportunity to share updates on the breed's second satellite flock project.

Steve and Debbie Milne, Richmond Hill Agribusiness, announced that the Association is currently participating in its second round satellite flock for eating quality in carcase traits,  Brenton Addis, Yonga Downs stud, WA, with Troy Fischer, Ashmore stud, SA.

"We will be very keen to see the results - we have sourced genetics that are relevant to as many breeders as possible."

Mr Gilmore is looking forward to the year ahead, especially with the focus on youth.

"This is the first time the Federal Council has implemented a youth committee, with a delegate in nearly every state. It is exciting for the breed to work with students and young breeders," he said.

"It was nice to see the enthusiasm and positive input from the younger generation."

For some breeders, this was their first time at a national conference.

This was the case for David Lieschke, Otto stud, Walla Walla.

Mr Lieschke and his wife Helen have been breeding White Suffolks since 2017.

"We bred them because we liked the ease of lambing and good lambing percentages. They also have good weight gain," he said.

Heading to the conference was a priority for the Lieschkes because of their 17-year-old son Tom.

"Tom is very keen on sheep work and is involved in the stud," he said.

"It was a good chance to ask questions and get updates on the breed, as well as meeting other breeders."

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
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

## LAMB SALES SET TO HIT 13.44 MILLION IN THE FIRST HALF OF 2023

#### **KEY POINTS**

- February 2023 Sheep Producer Intentions Pulse survey results indicate 51% of Australian producers sold less lambs than expected compared to the October survey results.
- The 'holding back' of lambs has led to 55% of producers expecting to increase their lamb sales in the first half of 2023.
- There may be an increase in yardings to come. This will support MLA's recent projection of record lamb production for 2023.

The results from Meat & Livestock Australia and Australian Wool Innovation's *February 2023 Sheep Producer Intentions - PULSE survey* were released in March, providing updated estimates of the October 2022 producer lamb sales estimates.

#### **LAMB SALES**

Results from the survey indicated that 51% of Australian producers had sold fewer lambs than expected by the end of 2022.

With total lamb sales at the end of last year reaching an estimated 8.75 million, this was 3.09 million head less than the projection estimates from the October 2022 Sheep Intentions survey.

The decline in sales was mostly attributed to weather conditions impacting producers' ability to achieve the targeted lamb performance required for sale. Lamb condition and weight have been key determinants of market price over the last few months, as buyers have plenty of stock to choose from.

Other reasonings were:

- prices not being strong enough (25%)
- less lambs than expected from the 2022 drop (13%)
- harvest activities being prioritised (12%).

Although labour issues have been felt across the supply chain, therefore restricting processor capacity, only 6% of producers who sold fewer lambs than expected attributed it to processor availability issues.

The 'holding back' of lambs at the end of last year resulted in 55% of producers expecting to sell more lambs in the first half of 2023 across most states and all farm sizes.

This translates to an increase of 3.27 million lambs to be sold on top of the estimates from the October survey, or a total of 13.44 million head, in the first half of 2023.

#### **LAMB YARDINGS**

Lamb yardings week-to-date for 2023 have increased 15% year-on-year as more lambs come to weight and hit the market after the intensive rebuild period.




Figure 1. Lamb yarding comparisons 2021–23 Source: National Livestock Reporting Service (NLRS)

Week-on-week comparisons of lamb yardings from the last three years can be seen in the graph below (Figure 1).

The PULSE survey indicates that more lambs may hit the market in the coming months. This has the potential to place pricing pressures on the market and increase selectiveness from buyers.

MLA's February sheep projections forecast the 2023 flock size to reach its largest levels since 2007. This, along with lamb slaughter increasing to 22.6 million head in 2023 and reaching record levels in 2024, is supported by the lift in supply indicated in the survey.

The record production forecast for 2023 is more likely to occur as more lambs come into weight and are being sold. Carcase weights are set to remain historically high and slaughter is increasing.

At the saleyards, buyers can afford to be selective on what lambs to take and which ones to leave, which is leading to premium prices for lambs with weight and good condition.

With feed still available, producers are holding back lambs from last season and will be able to enter the market when their stock reach adequate weights. Processing space for small stock doesn't seem to be an issue for producers and suggests that production forecasts are attainable.

#### **LOOKING FORWARD**

The next Sheep Producer Intentions survey – set to be launched in May – will assess how many ewes producers expect to join for the coming lambing season.

Industry participation in these surveys is vitally important for the visibility of the industry and better decision making on-farm.

#### SATELLITE FLOCK AI COMPLETED JANUARY 2023

The AI for the satellite flock was completed on 11th and 12th January at the host property, Anden, in their fantastic AI centre. Ken Watson and Courtney from Tatiara Breeding Services completed the AI.

350 well grown maiden Merino ewes from Hamilton Run, Jamestown, SA, were prepared for AI by the Donnan family and in great condition on the day.

A total of 325 ewes were Al'd across the two days, with 25 ewes assigned to each sire.

Thank you to the Donnan family, David Pipkorn, Peter Angus, Andrew Frick, and Steve Milne for assisting with labour for the AI, and Debbie Milne for recording tags and sires on the day. A special thank you to the Donnan Family (Joel, Trent and Andrew) for their work and commitment towards the entire project, and to Denita Donnan for catering and arranging accommodation for those that assisted with the AI program.

Pregnancy Scanning results from March 2023

Pregnancy scanning of the 325 satellite flock ewes was completed on 23rd March.

72.92% of ewes are in lamb, with a total of 385 lambs from 325 ewes expected.

We are looking forward to seeing the lambs arrive in June.

#### THE NEXT STEPS

The sires of the lambs will be determined through DNA parentage tests, and full genomic tests on all lambs undertaken. All progeny will be weighed and scanned for fat and muscle prior to slaughter in October.

It is expected that the lambs will be slaughted in November / December 2023 at a facility determined by MLA. Assessment of all eating quality and carcase traits will be undertaken by the University of New England meat science team.

Once data has been collected and reviewed, it will be submitted to Sheep Genetics and contribute to the information used in the calculation of ASBVs for each sire. This will increase the accuracy of genomic tests done by any breeder on animals related to these sires for those hard to measure eating quality traits.

David Brockman and his family took out WAMMCO's Producer of the Month title for October 2022 with a line of 233 White Suffolk-Merino crossbred lambs processed at Katanning on October 1.

The winning October 2022 lambs averaged 22.09kg to return \$154 a head and recorded a high WAMMCO sweet spot of 99.57 per cent.

Most of these lambs were from Clanmea bred Merinos and White Suffolk rams purchased from the Lukin Springs stud, Boyup Brook, but the winning draft also included lambs sired by the first White Suffolk rams purchased from Craig Heggaton's BreedersBEST Genetics stud at Kojonup two years ago.

"We dropped 1700 crossbred lambs from 1500 ewes, achieving our best ever lambing percentage," David Brockman said.

"With the long growing season, 85pc of them were finished on green grass and averaged 22kg carcase weight.

"We run 3400 ewes joined 55:45 Merino/White Suffolk.

Mr Brockman said a change to July lambing for the Merino ewes had allowed him to carry a few more ewes. He said the opportunity to boost profitability via genetics, management and technology was too good for farmers to miss.



DECEMBER 2022:

CROWLEY FAMILY, GAIRDNER, WINS WAMMCO PRODUCER OF MONTH AWARD WITH WHITE SUFFOLK-MERINO CROSS LAMBS.

Winning WAMMCO's Producer of the Month title for December, 2022, would not have entered the minds of former shearing contractor Darrell Crowley and his wife Janine when they invested in their first small farm close to the Gairdner CBH bin, on the South Coast highway in 2007.

The winning December draft consisted of 126 White Suffolk-Merino lambs, processed at Katanning on December 19. They comprised tailenders for the season and averaged 21.96 kilograms to return \$142.45.

The WAMMCO Sweet Spot score used to determine winners, was an impressive 97.62 per cent.

The mix of Merino and White Suffolk genetics continues to dominate their breeding base, mainly with purchased ewes, and the rams supplied over the past 14 years by Rob and Stacey Bush's Ros Gywn White Suffolk stud at Mt Barker.

"As a shearer I love white points and white wool, a shed full of big wool bales and a truck load of heavy, healthy animals ready for market," Mr Crowley said.

#### JANUARY 2022:

## DAVY FAMILY WITH WAMMCO PRODUCER OF MONTH AWARD WITH A LINE OF WHITE SUFFOLK-MERINO CROSS LAMBS.

The Davy family, Blackboy Hill Farm, Wellstead, is the latest family farming business to join an impressive list of WAMMCO Producer of the Month winners.

A draft of 180 White Suffolk-Merino cross lambs from Blackboy Hills Farm, killed at WAMMCO Katanning on January 20 averaged 21.46 kilograms and returned \$138.91 including skin to reach a sweetspot of 97.78 per cent.

For nearly 35 years, the family's Merino flock has been based on Woodyarrup blood stock, both from the stud itself and from Bob Bairstow's original Kalgan Downs stud.

Wool has maintained a prominent place under the present family partnership because of the extra \$25 or so per head it continues to contribute each year.



"With lamb prices well down from more than \$8 per kg over the previous two years, the production of up to 400 bales of wool each year from our self-replacing flock of 7000 ewes is vital to help us to make up the difference," Robert said.

"We have also found that maintaining both spring and autumn shearing and our policy of mating about one third of our ewe flock to White Suffolk rams from the Hyde family's Kohat stud, assists us to get stock off the property quickly at a time when wool is also bringing some good prices."



FEBRUARY 2023:

**CANOWIE PASTORAL** COMPANY, GAIRDNER RIVER, WINS WAMMCO PRODUCER OF THE MONTH

The Griffiths family's winning WAMMCO consignment of 324 White Suffolk-Merino lambs, including a proportion of lambs from bought in ewes, was finished on a new deferment grazing/ feedlotting system installed on the Gairdner River property in 2022.

These lambs were processed at Katanning on February 13 to average 20.94 kilograms per head for a return per head of \$135.52.

The winning WAMMCO sweet spot score was 92.28 per cent.

The Griffiths family - like many other farming families in the region, moved to Gairdner River in the 1970s from Woogenellup, to gain more land at a lower price.


