





SA SHEEP EXPO HOSTS RECORD NUMBER OF ENTRANTS IN TRIUMPHANT RETURN



The SA Sheep Expo made a record-breaking return in April when young sheep enthusiasts from four states travelled to the Adelaide Showground to participate in its three-day educational program.

The focus of the event was on the 'ram', with entrants ranging from 12 to 24 years participating in a series of workshops and lectures with broad representation across the wool and sheep meat industry and supply chain.

Expo Chairman, Mark Grossman, said the program topics included ram selection, disease control, shearing shed and yard design, photography, and wool on-farm and off-farm.

"The Expo is very important for the young generation because it gives the opportunity to learn about all aspects within the sheep industry and offers careers for later in their lives," he said.

"The Senior group had the opportunity to get public speaking experience, learn how to present themselves and how to progress in their careers as well as learning how to help the younger generation."

In just its sixth year, the event achieved an attendance of 142 participants beating its previous record by just a few.

"This year we had a record number which is exciting and it's great to see first timers learning how it all works as well as people from sheep backgrounds."

While the focus was on opportunity and upskilling, participants also competed in their age groups with written and practical assessments to test their knowledge.

The competition culminated with the highly anticipated handler competition on the final day where handling skills were put to the test in front of an audience of parents, helpers and sponsors.



The ASSBA and SA Sheep Industry Fund Award of Excellence major prize was won by Caitlin Flanagan-Organ, a wool classer and shearing contractor from Bordertown, SA.

Ms Flanagan-Organ received a \$4,500 study tour bursary to New Zealand.

She said her experience at the Expo was surreal, with one speaker a standout of her week.

"To hear John Dalla speak at the dinner about his experience as part of the Australian shearing team was a very special for me," she said.

"But overall, the expo itself was invaluable and I feel very lucky to have been able to win the major prize."

"The study tour will be an amazing opportunity for me to broaden my industry experience."

She said the two things on her bucket list for her trip were to experience the fine wool industry and attend the Golden Shears.

"The win and the trip are great, but if I'm able to inspire one person to pursue a career in the industry I call that success over winning the award."

The Expo was generously supported by a host of major sponsors including industry partners - the Show Society Foundation, SA Sheep Industry Fund and Australian Wool Innovation.

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SHEEP & LAMB OUTLOOK – JULY 2023


Lamb markets are expected to encounter good numbers of new season lambs in the second half of 2023. As high supply continues, markets will be looking for direction from export demand which has been a mixed bag so far this year. A drier outlook should avoid the challenges presented by the wet conditions of late 2022 which culminated in a surge of supply in recent months.

The expansion mode of Australia's sheep flock is set to keep the industry in a high supply environment for the second half of 2023. A larger than normal carryover of lambs from late-2022 saw lamb slaughter in the first quarter of 2023 up 12.5 per cent year-on-year. Lamb supply is expected to come into closer alignment to trends from a year ago during the second half of 2023. Minor year-on-year increases to slaughter of around two per cent are expected on the back of flock growth. This will be offset by lighter average carcass weights due to forecast drier conditions. As a result, production volumes will be on par with 2022.


Consumer demand for lamb in Australia is set to remain subdued as consumers respond to challenging economic conditions. Inflation and higher interest rates will prompt many consumers to reassess purchases of higher-valued meat such as lamb in both retail and foodservice channels. This could result in a greater proportion of lamb being destined for export markets.

The ability of export markets to absorb increased production is key to the direction of prices. Currently, elevated production is finding a home in export markets, albeit at lower prices. The volume of lamb exports in January to April was 5.8 per cent higher year-on-year. However, the average unit price of exports has dropped by 15.3 per cent. Increased volumes but lower prices have resulted in the value of exports falling by 10.5 per cent. The decline in export value largely stems from weaker US demand. Export value to the US has fallen 25.7 per cent so far in 2023 as poor economic conditions in the US are weakening demand. Demand outlooks are more positive to other major markets. There has been a resurgence in demand from China and the UAE following poorer demand in 2021 and 2022. A sustained improvement in appetite for lamb has led to South Korea being the largest growth market in 2023. Export value to South Korea is up 35.3 per cent for the year-to-date which has seen it overtake the UAE to become the third most valuable market.

Lamb prices are set to remain subdued due to elevated supply forecast over the remainder of 2023. Supply is set to remain high deeper into winter than usual which will mean a delayed and limited winter price rally. Following winter, a relatively high and even flow of lambs will keep prices below five-year average levels. Aside from supply, prices will be waiting on further improvement in export demand to offset the high supply environment to provide any further upside. Mutton prices have spent much of 2023 below 400c/kg as supply has increased and demand for older sheep has waned. This is reflective of a national flock rebuild reaching maturation as producers offload older stock and are not looking to markets to supplement breeding ewes. These factors will remain in place for the remainder of 2023 and keep mutton prices subdued.

WHITE SUFFOLK SATELLITE FLOCK PROJECT UPDATE

Lambing for the Satellite Flock took place at Anden at the start of June 2023. Lambs were marked on Tuesday the 11th of July. The following table summarizes the results.

As can be seen above, there were less lambs than expected from the preg scan results. It would appear the preg scanning was perhaps overly optimistic and some twins were in the single group and some singles may have been in the twins. The ewes were lambed under commercial conditions without any interference. There was also some predation from foxes and eagles. The ewes and lambs were in excellent condition at marking.

Information recorded at marking was, group (twins or singles to determine birth type), sex of the lamb, tag number and TSU number. The lambs were double tagged with an EID and visual tag with the same tag number on both tags. Thank you to Shearwell for providing the tags.

Thanks to those who helped on the day including the Donnan family, Andrew, Joel, Trent and Denita, the Pipkorn family, David, Michelle and Jordy and Steve and Debbie Milne.

Satellite Flock project ewes

The 288 TSUs have been sent to Neogen for genomic and parentage tests to determine the sire. A weaning weight will be taken in late August, weights and fat and muscle scans in September and a pre slaughter weight taken in October.

Following slaughter of all lambs in October, the carcases will be measured and analysed by the Meat Science team from the University of New England. All data on the live animals and carcase and eating quality measurements will be submitted to Sheep Genetics. An analysis will be undertaken on the changes to the sire ASBVs and accuracies and a final report on the project will be completed early in 2024.

WHITE SUFFOLKS TRANSFORM SHEEP BREEDING FOR BAIRNSDALE PRODUCER

It's not often that changing a ram can transform an operation.

But that's exactly what White Suffolks have done for Merino producer Mark Norling.

The Bairnsdale producer has been using White Suffolk rams over his Merino ewes, and he's so impressed, he won't use a Merino ram again.

Mr Norling and his wife Paulette, Albert Park, run two properties in the Bairnsdale region. Before the drought they ran cattle, but then they turned to Merinos, running 17 to 18-micron ewes.

But their pure flock was about to change. Already they were tired of poor lambing percentages, and the wool price dipping.

But then one day a sheep breeder from NSW commented how their country at Bairnsdale was ideal for running crossbreds.

After chatting with their agents Marc Braybon and Brad Obst, Nutrien Deniliquin, their minds were made up.

"He said the White Suffolks were easy lambers and grew well," he said.

Two years ago they bought their first White Suffolk rams from the Jamieson family at Wattle Park stud, Finley, joining them to 2000 Merino ewes.

And for Mr Norling, there are no two ways about it.

"It has been a huge success," he said.

"They have been exceptional. With Merino rams, we were getting joining percentages of 90 to 100 per cent in lamb, while with the White Suffolk rams we are getting 110 to 120pc."

When it came to lambing, he was getting 50 to 60pc lambing percentages using Merino rams, while he gets 100pc with the White Suffolk rams.

"I've found the White Suffolk-cross lambs also mother really well," he said.

He said they had even stopped having to pull lambs and found the White Suffolk ewes to be fantastic mothers.

On top of all this, he found the worm burden was less with the White Suffolk genetics.

"We lamb in autumn, so we would have worm problems. But the crossbred lambs don't seem to pick up the worms as much," he said.

He said the White Suffolk-cross lambs were making \$195 a head plus wool.

"Their fleece is \$13 worth of wool, which is more than paying for shearing," he said.

Now Mr Norling joins every ewe to White Suffolk rams.

When choosing rams, he is looking for a number of things to ensure they suit his Merinos breeders.

"I want a smooth-shouldered ram, long in the body, with good figures for low birthweight and growth," he said.

"I want a ram that will give us meat."

Ewe shearing takes place in September, and the lambs are weaned. Good sucker lambs are sold and the rest are put on crops and shorn in November. He keeps the 250 to 300 of the best White Suffolk ewe lambs as breeders. He said 80pc of remaining White Suffolk-cross ewes are sold to other producers are future breeders.

The wethers and surplus ewes are placed into the small onproperty feedlot when they reach 35 to 40 kilograms. When they reach 55 to 60kg in the feedlot, which usually takes six to eight weeks, they are sold to JBS Australia.

He said the lambs put on 350 to 450 grams a day in the feedlot in warmer weather.

"They have exceptionally good weight gains," he said.

He now buys in replacement Merino ewes, and eventually plans to run 2500 Merino ewes and 2000 White Suffolk ewes.

Once he has built up his pure White Suffolk ewe numbers, he will use bigger, more robust White Suffolk rams.

He said one of the defining factors for the turnaround in their enterprise was a helping hand.

"Marc Braybon at Nutrien gave good advice, and the best part is John [Jamieson, Wattle Park stud] gives us great advice. He's great. He calls us and asks about the lambs and what yields we are getting," he said.

Mr Norling is thrilled how White Suffolks have transformed their sheep breeding.

"I really like them as sheep, and I like their temperament. They suit our country and how we operate," he said.

"We are exceptionally happy. I can't express how impressed we are."

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SHEEP GENETICS UPDATE

Sheep Genetics implements analysis enhancements each year – in 2023, there were updates to the lambing ease analysis and the accuracy calculations in the TERMINAL analysis.

Briefly, the lambing ease analysis has been updated to dead at birth (DAB) data in the lambing ease analysis and updating to now use a single-step model (enables the inclusion of genomic information) for lambing ease ASBVs. This has resulted in more accurate lambing ease ASBVs, more animals receiving a lambing ease ASBV, and a positive change in lambing ease genetic trends in the Terminal analysis. The accuracy value (i.e., accuracy only, not ASBVs) was also updated as part of the 2023 analysis enhancements for the Terminal and Maternal analysis.

EATING QUALITY

Sheep Genetics is working with breeders who are consigning SG animals to abattoirs, collecting commercial measures of eating quality. This applies to those who are processing animals that are in an SG evaluation and getting individual animal feedback for intra-muscular fat (from a probe or other device) and yield data (via DEXA). The intention is to investigate the relationship between these commercial measurements and the research measurements routinely taken in the MLA Resource Flock, to determine if commercial measures can be included in the genetic evaluation. If you have a consignment of animals that meets these requirements and are interested in being involved, please contact SG before the animals are consigned to ensure that all the necessary information is collected.


Please see the below requirements for breeders who are wanting to collect commercial carcase measurements:


- Animals must have a Sheep Genetics ID and are in the Sheep Genetics evaluation (either excess animals from the stud or have pedigree information)
- A pre-slaughter weight (4 hours fasted) on-farm prior to slaughter
- Ideally pre-slaughter weight is to be recorded as soon as possible to the animals going onto the truck to slaughter, however, pre-slaughter measurements can be taken up to 7 days prior to slaughter
- Date of pre-slaughter measurements
- Management group of animals Kill date and consignment number
- Where possible, we recommend taking the following on farm pre-slaughter measurements
 - ◊ Condition score
 - > Fat and Muscle scan data



2023 for the analysis run date of 15.07.23).

A recent Genetic Insights Survey by Meat & Livestock Australia reported that more than half of commercial producers are using ASBVs. Also, significantly more commercial producers who use ASBVs report their financial health is improving, compared to commercial producers who do not use ASBVs (61% vs 41%). 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
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
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MERINOS STILL DOMINATE MEATELINESTOCK AUSTRALIA'S BREEDING EWE FLOCK

Australia's breeding ewe flock – and subsequently the 2023 lamb cohort – is still primarily built on Merino genetics, particularly for producers with more than 5,000 sheep.


The May wave of the *Sheep Producer Intentions Survey* provided unique insights into the genetic makeup of the nation's breeding ewes by breed, as well as producers' flock sizes.

Nearly 2,000 sheep and wool producers from across Australia were surveyed in order to measure breeding intentions, sentiment, breeding ewe breed demographics and similar information for wethers.

MERINOS CONTINUE TO DOMINATE

The Sheep Producer Intentions Survey report segments results by state and producer flock size. This segmentation shows how the breakdown of breeding ewes by breed changes as flocks get larger.

The data indicates that Merinos dominate as the breed of choice for breeding ewe flocks, especially once the flock's size reaches 5,000 or more sheep.



Breeding ewe breed breakdown by flock size

Figure 1: Australian breeding ewes by breed and producer flock size.

Merinos make up:

- 59% of ewes in a 0-5,000 head flock
- 70% of ewes in a 5,000–10,000 head flock
- 69% of ewes in a 10,000-20,000 head flock
- 76% of ewes in a 20,000+ head flock.

Prime lamb breeding ewe numbers remain stable with larger producers, accounting for 16% and 15% respectively for producers with 10,000–20,000 and 20,000+ head flocks.

Producers with less than 5,000 sheep have a much more diversified spread of breeds across the breeding ewe base, as Merinos make up a smaller portion of the total (although still dominant).

As Figure 1 indicates, the larger the flocks get, the more dominant Merinos become, demonstrating that most of Australia's large sheep flocks are built on Merino genetics.



2023 LAMB CROPS AND PRODUCER SIZE

The survey data also provided insights into the expected genetic makeup of the 2023 lamb crop.

Joining Merino ewes for purebred Merino lamb production remains the dominant mating process for producers with 5,000 or more sheep.

The mating process of joining non-Merino ewes for lamb production increased significantly for producers with less than 5,000 sheep, accounting for 45% (on average) of the total lambs expected for 0–5,000 head flocks.

This data aligns with the October wave of the Sheep Producers Intentions Survey, indicating that flocks with less than 5,000 sheep will see large numbers of lambs with pure meat breedbased genetics in their 2023 drop.

Conversely, the opposite relationship is true where the percentage of Merinos joined for purebred or crossbred lamb production rises as flock sizes increase. For producers with more than 5,000 sheep, Merino ewes destined to breed purebred Merino lambs accounted for 53% or 9.2 million of total ewes expected to be joined.

WRAP UP

This segmentation and breakdown of ewes by breed indicates that Merinos remain the key component of the nation's breeding ewe base, particularly for producers with 5,000 or more sheep. Smaller producers have a much more diversified spread of ewes by different breeds.

Importantly, the lamb crop of 2023 will also have a diversified offering of different breeds, with smaller producers supplying large numbers of lambs with pure meat breed-based genetics for the spring flush in 2023. Larger producers with a pure Merino-based genetic lamb crop will support the nation's woolgrowing intentions.

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
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WHITE SUFFOLKS THE RIGHT MATCH FOR BOONDEROO

Lachie Seears wants a sheep with a frame that can carry plenty of meat.

And he has found White Suffolks bring just that, as well as a swag of benefits to his high rainfall country flock.

Mr Seears, Boonderoo Pastoral Company, southwest of Lucindale in the lower southeast, runs his property with his wife Rebecca and children Hugh and Anneliese, with the help of his parents Peter and Helen Seears and staff Michael Levick and James McIntosh.

The family is running a mix of cattle, sheep and broadacre cropping on the 6000-hectare family farm.

It is at least 15 years since the family began using White Suffolk rams as a terminal sire over a majority of its Composite selfreplacing breeding flock. "For me being a prime lamb producer, I just think they really have the frame around them to be able to put the meat on the bone," he said.

"Around 98 per cent of our lambs go to slaughter, so we like what they have brought to the lamb as far as meat production and yield. We liked that they had that stretch in the frame that allowed us to put the kilos on the animal."

The make-up of the White Suffolk brings plenty of benefits at lambing time.

"We like the White Suffolk breed because of that ease of lambing. With the size of production we have going on, I don't have time to get around them and check them every day. It's more of a set and forget deal," he said.

"They are great mothers, and we get an average lambing of 140 to 150 per cent."

The Seears family sources its White Suffolk rams from Peter Angus' Maroola stud, Mallala.

Rams that excel in yield and growth rates to finish lambs as soon as possible are crucial.

"I like Pete's rams. I like the way he is building his stud flock. I have so much confidence in him that I don't even go up there - I tell him what I am looking for and let Pete pick them out," he said.

"They've been fantastic rams. I really like the way he's built that stud up over the years. As Pete's stud has got better and he's sourced better rams, we've seen that direct flow-through to our commercial flock here. The lambs are doing better here."

Ewes are joined from mid-January until the end of February, with lambs born in winter. They've begun weaning the lambs from 15 to 16 weeks old.

"It depends on the season, but in the last five years, we've shifted towards an earlier weaning. We're getting them off mum, getting them on some lush clover tucker and moving forward from there," he said. The Seears family has irrigated country, so this plays a big role in producing quality lambs, with the earliest finished at 20 to 24 weeks old.

"We are lambing ewes on some mixed clover and grass pivots at the moment, but then once they are finished lambing we will set those pivots up in the spring to basically become a lamb factory to try and get as many lambs off as quickly as we can in the wool," he said.

"Anything that is a bit later we will shear. With our cropping program, we grow a lot broadbeans, so we will finish those lambs on those broadbeans. So after harvest from mid-January to mid-March we run lambs on bean stubbles and turn them off there.

"I'm trying to structure a production system that gives us a bit of flexibility depending on seasonal variation."

All White Suffolk-cross lambs are sold over the hook at a range of meatworks in the south east and into Victoria.

"We have multiple meatworks we like to supply to," he said. "We've always got good feedback around how the lambs hang up."



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WHITE SUFFOLKS RIDE THE WAVE OF A CHALLENGING MARKET

White Suffolk listings have hit record highs in the first quarter of 2023, as an influx of new season 2022 lambs hit the market later than usual.

The 180,016 head was up 21% on the same period in 2022 and 30% on 2021. Although listings were very strong in quarter 1, this trend has not been maintained into quarter 2, as the 44,909 head total is below 2020, 2021 and 2022 as the uncertainty in the market has impacted the overall sheep market.

Reviewing 2022, White Suffolk listings failed to maintain the strong start that was seen in the first 6 months of the year. Listings for the year fell short of 2020 and the record year of 2021 as wet conditions resulted in logistical issues with getting stock to market, coupled with the concerns of an exotic disease incursion resulted in particularly low supply in the back half of the year in an otherwise high new season supply period. As shown in figure 1, the backlog of new season lambs in 2022 ended up coming through the system in quarter 1 2023.

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


Figure 2: Annual White Suffolk listings, 2017 – 2023* as of 30th June




Figure 3: Monthly White Suffolk listings 2021 – 2023* as of 30th June

As previously mentioned, listings in 2022 were unseasonably low in August and September, as farmers chose to retain lambs on farm before reassessing the market situation (Figure 3). This was combined with lambs being market ready later than usual as the wet and muddy conditions meant fattening lambs was slower than usual. Figure 3 highlights how listings tracked on their corresponding month each year, with the first 6 months of 2022 aligning with 2021, but the winter months and into spring was where the deficit was met.

As seen in figure 4, prices have returned to levels last seen in 2019, falling from highs of \$180 to around \$100 for crossbred White Suffolk lambs in the second quarter of 2023. Along with the fall in prices has been a decline in clearance rates, as restocking demand has dropped off after three consecutive years of flock rebuilding.

WHITE SUFFOLK STUD SALES

The number of White Suffolk stud sales on AuctionsPlus has been increasing year on year, with 2022 seeing a total of 51 sales interfaced on the platform. While average bids per sale, number of logins, lots purchased and catalogue views have decreased from the highs of 2020, the current levels are still extremely strong. So far in 2023 an average of 30 lots are being purchased by online buyers and sale catalogues are being viewed by an average of 1,812 users. As we move towards spring, there will be a large increase in sales utilsing the online platform. 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SPOTTED! STUD BREEDERS UNDER 30 TO WATCH

Stock Journal (SA) recently ran a series on studbreeders under 30 years to watch, which featured some of our up-and-coming White Suffolk young guns – Ben Frick (Gypsum Hill), and Lachlan & Stefan Grossman (Koonawarra). Read what they had to say about their involvement in the industry.



LACHLAN & STEFAN GROSSMAN

Breeding sheep is an all-family affair for the Grossmans at Angaston, with the next generation making its own mark on the Koonawarra stud.

Brothers Lachlan, 26, and Stefan, 24, Grossman have been stepping up and finding their place in the White Suffolk, Poll Dorset and Border Leicester stud started by parents Mark and Jane Grossman.

Lachlan and Stefan say they have been surrounded by the sheep all their lives, which has helped them develop a real passion for breeding.

The White Suffolk stud began in 1985, with the Border Leicesters added in 1996.

In 2018, with both sons wanting to get involved, as well as to provide another option for their clients, the family added the Poll Dorsets to the mix.

In the 2022 sale, they offered 100 White Suffolk rams as well as 30 each of Poll Dorsets and Border Liecester rams and 10 White Suffolk ewes.

The stud is an all-family affair, with all sire selection based on a conversation.

As well as helping the family's stud, Lachlan has continued to show his interest in the sheep industry in other ways.

He is a part-time shearer, travelling the state and working in sheds, as well as

Lachlan has also been involved in the SA Sheep Expo nearly every year since it began, first as a participant and - more recently - on the committee. "It's about coming up with different ideas, trying to get the next generation involved," he said.

Lachlan also has a good eye for the sheep, having represented SA in the meat sheep junior judging competition national stage.

He also sits on a number of committees, including the Adelaide region Poll Dorset committee and the SA branch of the Australian Border Leicester Association.

"It's good to catch up with other people and discuss different ideas and topics," he said.

The Grossmans also run a self-replacing commercial Merino flock, and - of the four breeds - Lachlan says Border Leicesters are his favourite.

It is the White Suffolks that Stefan prefers, although there is a general interest in all sheep.

As well as also taking part in the SA Sheep Expo, he is a mainstay of the stud's exhibiting efforts, at country shows and the Royal Adelaide Show.

He has helped pick out their show team, and is a regular on the show mat, displaying the sheep.

He says this is a great chance to line their sheep up against other breeders to benchmark, as well as to speak with other people in the industry.

While he helps with the entire stud, Stefan also has his own ewes within the stud, following through some ewe bloodlines."It's about coming up with different ideas, trying to get the next generation involved," he said.



BEN FRICK

A passion for showing sheep has led one industry up-andcomer to start his own stud alongside his two sisters.

Padthaway's Ben Frick, whose parents Andrew and Tanya Frick are stud principals of Gypsum Hill White Suffolks and Suffolks, branched out on his own with sisters Amelia and Jessica to create Emmavale Suffolks.

With a wealth of experience and knowledge passed down from their parents, the young trio set out to start their own stud in 2020 which has since grown to six breeding ewes.

"We started our stud as a fun side project more than anything," he said.

"It helps us learn more about breeding but we're not worried about selling sheep, we'd like to look more at showing sheep which is our main focus."

Because of his love of showing, Ben said he looked for true to type sheep when purchasing genetics for his flock rather than breeding values, with ewes purchased from Aylesbury Farm, Ramsay Park and Bowen, NSW, in addition to using Gypsum Hill genetics.

Although he now has his own stud, Ben is heavily involved in Gypsum Hill, moving into a leadership role recently at just 18-years-old.

Through his new role, a recent highlight for Ben was taking Gypsum Hill sheep back into the show ring after more than a decade away from the Royal.

"I took Gypsum Hill rams to the show last year for the first time in about 15 years," he said.

"Dad's had the stud for about 45 years, and he used to show a lot before us kids came along.

"He stopped showing but I've found a love of showing myself so I got a show team together last year and took them to the Royal - we didn't win anything but it was a good experience and a great feeling to bring our sheep back to the show after so many years.

"We haven't been able to take Emmavale sheep to the show yet, but I'm hopeful we can either this year or next."

Although his major focus is showing sheep, another highlight of Ben's young life was having one of his own rams used in the Gypsum Hill breeding program.

"At the moment our stud is a fun project, but in the future I'm hoping to have a completely different line of sheep to Gypsum Hill," he said.

"Dad used our ram as an outcross sire in the stud to bring in different genetics which is what I'd like to continue to achieve in the future."


The career's panel was also a big highlight, it was so interesting to learn about how many different careers there are surrounding the sheep industry.



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DNA TECHNOLOGY – AN IMPORTANT TOOL FOR RAM BREEDERS

DNA based technologies have revolutionised livestock breeding in recent times, with DNA testing now routinely incorporated within dairy, sheep, and beef breeding programs around the world.

As with any new and emerging technology, White Suffolk ram breeders should be considering whether DNA technology offers benefits to their enterprise, and if so, how it is best applied alongside other reproductive and genetic technologies within their breeding program.

USES OF DNA TECHNOLOGY

DNA based technologies can be used for several different purposes within a White Suffolk breeding program, including:

Parentage verification - A small percentage of errors will undoubtedly exist within parentage information that is collected via traditional means due to factors such as cross mothering and human transcription errors. DNA technology enables these errors to be identified and corrected, increasing the reliability of the parentage information that is available for animals within a flock.


Parentage assignment - In situations where parentage information is not available via traditional means, DNA technology can be used to assign the sire and dam of an animal. Use of DNA technology for parentage assignment offers several benefits including the use of syndicate joining groups, or a reduction in the on-farm labour associated with the traditional collection of parentage information.

Incorporation into LAMBPLAN ASBVs - When combined with pedigree and performance information, DNA, or genomic

information, adds an additional source of information for the calculation of Australian Sheep Breeding Values (ASBVs), as published from the LAMBPLAN genetic evaluation, enabling the generation of ASBVs with additional accuracy, and ultimately enabling more accurate selection decisions to be made.

Genomic information provides the most additional accuracy to the calculation of ASBVs:

- for animals that have incomplete, or a limited depth of pedigree
- for traits that are hard to measure, or traits that cannot be measured prior to an animal entering the breeding flock.
- for traits that have a low heritability.
- in situations where collecting effective performance information is problematic, such as in small flocks, or when an animal has been removed from its contemporary group.

DEVELOPING A DNA TESTING STRATEGY FOR YOUR FLOCK

Prior to investing in DNA based technologies, it is important that ram breeders develop a specific DNA testing strategy for their flock to ensure that they maximise the benefits that are obtained. When developing a DNA testing strategy, consideration should be given to such things as:

WHAT DNA SAMPLES WILL BE COLLECTED?

DNA samples can be collected in a number of different forms, including Tissue Sampling Units (TSUs), blood cards and semen straws. Of these, the recommended and most common form of DNA sample collection due its ease of collection and reliability during laboratory processing is TSUs.

Using a specific TSU applicator, TSUs involve collection of a simple tissue sample from the middle of the ear, making sure the TSU has been sealed correctly and then placing it into a TSU box or rack for mailing to the DNA laboratory.

WHEN WILL DNA SAMPLES BE COLLECTED?

DNA samples can be collected on animals of any age, and so should be undertaken at a time that best fits in with other normal, routine management practices, ensuring sufficient time is left for the availability of results.

DNA results are usually available within approximately four weeks from the time the samples arrive at the laboratory. An additional one to two weeks should also be factored in for the results to be processed through the LAMBPLAN analysis (data runs are conducted on the 1st and 15th of each month).

WHAT ANIMALS WILL BE TESTED?

Testing can be conducted as many or few animals as desired, depending on the objective.

Common testing strategies include a) testing an individual animal; b) strategically testing a group of animals of specific interest. For example, the top 30% of a cohort of ram lambs that have been identified as potential selection candidates; or c) testing an entire drop of lambs.

WHICH DNA PRODUCT WILL BE UTILISED?

The two most common DNA products are the 'Parentage Test', which links a lamb to its sire and/or dam, and the 'Genomic Test', which includes the parentage test, along with a high-density genotype for inclusion in the calculation of LAMBPLAN ASBVs.

The 'Genomic Test' involves genotyping animals with a customised DNA chip that was developed specifically for use in the Australian sheep industry known as the GGP Ovine 50K. The chip was developed in collaboration with researchers at the University of New England, Agriculture Victoria and the Animal Genetics and Breeding Unit and specifically includes SNPs that explain the most genetic variation in the Australian sheep population. Research has shown that the inclusion of these SNPs on the chip increases accuracy by 7-10% by comparison to generic DNA chips.

RAMS

Masculine in appearance, displaying a strong carcase on good structure.

EWES

Showing great femininity, with sound udder formation.

HEAD & EARS

Free of wool from the ears forward, sound mouth & bottom jaw, little to no colour, pigmentation of eyes & nostrils accepted & encouraged. Large ears, thick & not erect.

Muzzle maybe slightly convex, no horns or scurs present.

NECK & SHOULDERS

A moderate neck flowing into a smooth shoulder setting with limited blade movement when walking.

BACK & LOIN

A straight top line, firm with well sprung ribs & a wide deep loin.

TAIL SETTING

Well set up just below the level of the spine.

HIND QUARTERS Full wide & deep with heavily muscled thighs.

CARCASE

Heavy, carry from front to back in a slight wedge shape.

LEGS & FEET

Legs well placed at the four quarters & free moving, free of wool from the knees & hocks, strong bone, compact straight hoofs (not splayed), with erect pasterns that still have some forgiveness.

SKIN

Pink in colour & free of pigment.

WOOL

Fine 'downs' type, dense & free of kemp, medullated & coloured fibres.

TESTICLES

Testicles even, firm & moderate in size.

The AWSA encourages the use of performance recording & genetic evaluation systems coupled with these visual traits by all members in the pursuit of maintaining the excellence in the White Suffolk Breed.
