

There has been some confusion this year with rams at auction being sold and purchases having to advance to a stud registration minimum. The vendor has the right to enforce this, but it must be announced prior to the auction commencing.

Both Peter and Graham were foundation members of the Association and have both been influential in the development of the breed and encouragement of breeders of all ages across Australia. Over the past few selling months, White Suffolk promotion has been ticking along through print and digital media. The breed has featured well in sale reports which also gives great exposure and promotion.

A few highlights to report on since the last newsletter:

- New video footage was obtained and used to revamp the TV Advertisement. Thank you to Brayden Gilmore for his assistance with this. We also strengthened our campaign with the slogan 'A flocking great choice' - a play on words to attract the attention of listeners.
- Thank you to all members that promoted the Win A Ram competition at their sales and through social media and newsletters. While the number of entries was less than the previous year, it is still very encouraging to see entrants from across all states. The positive comments entrants share on the White Suffolk breed are enlightening, and you may see some of these shared across our social media soon.
- New merchandise is now available to purchase in the new online store on the AWSA website – Hoodies, Trucker Caps, Show Vests and a Standard AWSA Cap. Thank you to all members that have already purchased items. I was fortunate to take some new hoodies to the Elite Show & Sale in September where they were well received by the kids in attendance and looked great around the shed.



SHEEP & LAMB OUTLOOK - OCTOBER 2023

Australian lamb prices are expected to remain relatively stable over the next few weeks, with any uplift to be limited by the high volume of lambs expected to flow through the market. Lamb prices have fallen sharply since the start of the year but have stabilised and made modest gains over the past 6 weeks. The National Trade Lamb Indicator has gained 53 cents (+12 per cent) over the past month but still lags 338 cents (-41 per cent) below this time last year.

Prices have faced downwards pressure from the high supply of lambs coming through the market. Lamb slaughter has averaged over 429,000 head per week in October, up almost 28,000 head (+7 per cent) from October 2022, and 55,000 head (+15 per cent) above the five-year average for the month. This trend has been consistent throughout the year, with year-to-date lamb slaughter up 32,000 head per week (+9 per cent) from 2022.

The high supply of lambs is unlikely to slow over the next few months. The forecast is for a bumper crop of new season lambs which will continue to flow through the market. Restocker demand has been reduced over the past few months due to the dry seasonal conditions and outlook. The recent rainfall has seen an uptick in demand however the forecast of a dry summer will continue to limit restocker confidence. The continued high supply and dry seasonal outlook will limit any significant uplift in prices over the next couple of months.

Domestic retail demand for lamb is starting to return, as the reduced saleyard prices are slowly being passed onto consumers. Export volumes remain high as processors look to find a home for the additional product available. There was over 31,000 tonnes of lamb exported in September, up 26 per cent from September last year and 35 per cent above the 5-year average. China and the US continue to be the major markets for Australian lamb. Exports to the US started the year slowly but have improved over the past five months, while exports to China have returned to normal levels following a drop off in 2022.


Mutton prices have tracked steadily throughout October aside from a brief spike following rain at the start of the month. The National Mutton Indicator is down 352 cents (-77 per cent) since the start of the year and plunged to its lowest point since 2013 in late-September. Prices have struggled with the surplus of supply, with weekly mutton slaughter for September up 47.2 per cent from last year. Mutton supply has surged as farmers looked to turn-off stock to manage feed availability. The increased supply of mutton has continued to flow onto the export market. Mutton exports are up 47 per cent by volume so far this year, with China remaining the predominant market. However, reports of large quantities of meat in freezers is putting a dampener on prices. The supply of mutton is unlikely to slow over the next few months, which will maintain downwards pressure on prices.



HONORARY LIFE MEMBERSHIP: GRAHAM DAY

As a 10 year old - decades before the White Suffolk breed was established - Graham Day brought up with his father Allen the need to breed a Suffolk sheep without black wool fibres.

At the Day family's 51st annual ram sale in early October, Graham was presented with a plaque by Australian White Suffolk Association immediate past president Anthony Hurst for more than 40 years service to the breed.

The Allendale Suffolk stud was established in 1931 and is the nation's oldest Suffolk stud but in 1984 Graham put some Suffolk sires over their Poll Dorset ewes.

"I always thought Suffolks were a great breed for their early growth and carcase qualities but I knew with the country being so wool conscious that the black fibres were holding it back," he said.

The following year when the AWSA was established Allendale was one of the foundation studs as flock number nine. Graham attended the first meeting of the society and was elected to the committee, a position he held for six years.

"A lot of the early breeders were such successful stud people and had open minds that it was always going to be a success taking two great breeds and making a sheep that was the best of the two breeds," Graham said.

Anthony said Graham was instrumental in the establishment of the White Suffolk National Field Day held at Dookie in Victoria which enabled breeders to compare their stock and breeding ideas. It evolved into the National White Suffolk Conference which is held annually.

"It is testament to Graham's passion in giving members a forum and the opportunity to network and compare their programs and success," he said.

Over the years Anthony says Graham has always been encouraging of young stud breeders and a great mentor to many.

"I remember work experience here at the age of 14 when I had started my own White Suffolk stud, I certainly wouldn't have been doing that without Graham's passion and involvement in what we did," he said.

Allendale had plenty of showring success in the early years of the breed and also built a strong White Suffolk client base.

In 2009 after a restructure of the family business one of Graham's sons Lachy and his wife Lou took over the White Suffolk flock as the Days Whiteface stud. They have continued to drive it forward with assistance from Graham.

Graham says it has been wonderful to witness the growth in the breed's popularity as a prime lamb sire but he and his wife Prue's greatest pleasure had come from the friendships with fellow stud breeders and clients.


"We haven't made our fortune doing it but meeting all the people from the different breeds has been so wonderful," he said.

Graham is now a life member of all three sheep breeds he has been involved in, as well as Herefords Australia and has also been recognised with a President's Medal from the Royal Melbourne Show.



The number of lambs per sire at each stage is shown in the table below. One lamb is still waiting for the re-test of its parentage (result expected next week).

Carcase and eating quality measurements are being undertaken by the Meat Science team from the University of New England. Once all tests are completed the data will be entered into the LAMBPLAN database and contribute to the sire's breeding values.

A detailed analysis of the changes to the breeding values and accuracies will be undertaken at the completion of the project. The results of this analysis will be presented at the AWSA National Conference in February 2024.

If Rohan Longbottom can get a fantastic wool cut, as well as a meaty prime lamb, he's laughing.

And using White Suffolk rams over his Merino ewes is ticking both those boxes.

Mr Longbottom, his wife Courtney and son Harvey, Longbottom Pastoral Co, Bordertown, rely on White Suffolks to bring meat and growth to lambs by their wool-growing Merino ewes.

The Longbottom family runs an engineering and fabrication business, but as the years have gone on, the family farming operation has grown to become just as important.

"The farm started as a hobby, but over time it just got bigger and bigger," he said.

LONG HISTORY

Mr Longbottom came by his love of White Suffolks honestly - his parents Shane and Linda ran White Suffolks, and they are still heavily involved in the farm to this day.

The Longbottom family runs 2500 Merino ewes, using White Suffolk and Suffolk rams over the top.

This has given their production two big bonuses.

"Having the White Suffolks meant we could still get a wool cut out of the ewe, and then also get a prime lamb," he said.

"Every lamb on the place is terminal, so the White Suffolk was the best option over the Merino ewe.

"It allowed us to end up with a pretty good prime lamb.

"If we pick our Merino ewe correctly, they produce a long, heavy-framed lamb.

"The yields and the carcase that come off the White Suffolks are great.

"We just started using them and had success. We were so happy with how it was going, so we just continued."

He said working with White Suffolks was great.

"They are a lot easier in the yards," he said. "Compared to some others, they don't give your dogs a hard time and they don't get angry and stirred up.

"They are pretty neutral, cruisy sheep. The White Suffolks are a lot nicer."

He said the White Suffolk lambs mothered up well.

"These lambs are a bit keener to have a feed," he said.

CLOSE TO HOME

The Longbottom family has been using genetics from Lachy Day's Days Whiteface stud for a number of years.

And the fact he is just across the paddock is only one of the reasons they source their rams from the stud.

"Going to their ram sale is just the closest and easiest one, but they also have some of the best White Suffolks around. So it doubled up as the easiest thing to do," he said.

He also sources rams from Anthony Hurst's Seriston stud, Avenue.

Because he is joining the White Suffolks to Merino ewes, there are a couple of things he really wants to see when he is picking out his rams.

"We want low birthweight and high growth," he said.

"We usually choose out of the catalogue, but we also want a good fat score and decent eye muscle.

"We also want good feet and a good looking head - you don't want an ugly sheep. You want sheep to be nicely shaped - nothing too tall. It takes too much energy growing hide instead of growing fat.

"We want smaller in the shoulders, bigger in the butt.

"We also really work on ease of lambing - it can be a nightmare to be chasing sheep.

"We've just really worked on that for the past five years, and I think our lambing has got much easier."

He said using White Suffolk genetics also brought better lambing percentages.

"Depending on the season, we normally lamb between 105 to 120 per cent," he said.

STRONG CROSS

The Longbottom family buys in all replacement Merino ewes to be joined to terminal sires.

Suffolk rams are joined to their oldest five-and-half-year-old ewes in October for a March lambing.

"This means we never need to put black wool through our shed. We sell them first in spring, but they never get shorn," he said

"The rest of the ewes are joined to a White Suffolk in December, January and February, so we have three lambings and spread them out."

Lambs are weaned between 12 and 14 weeks old, and are grazed on quality pastures.

These include a combination of barley, rye grass and clover.

The lambs are drafted into weight groups.

"We will categorize them into heavies, mediums and lights, and then the different groups will be grazed in their mobs," he said.

GETTING RESULTS

Lambs are sold over the hook when they reach around 50 kilograms live, bringing a carcase weight of around 22 to 24kg.

All lambs are sent to JBS Australia in Bordertown.



Mr Longbottom has taken special care to be involved in the process and understand how their lambs are stacking up.

This has included being in the JBS Farm Assurance program.

"We've toured JBS when our lambs were killed," he said.

"They've given us the full run-down, and we've been able to talk to the meat inspectors and others there.

"They said they are always really happy when they see our lambs come through on the sheet.

"He said they cut up easily and they don't have grass seeds. So we've had great feedback."

In the future the Longbottom family plans to grow their flock, but the White Suffolk involvement is staying put on the family farm

"We're definitely not looking to move into another breed," he said

"We are just looking to develop what we are doing and to get higher percentages and turn lambs off quicker."

With ram selling season beginning to wrap up and breeders starting to think about joining decisions, it's important to set yourself up for success.

Some important considerations before making joining decisions include:

- What is your Breeding Objective? (also, consider the needs of your ram buyers)
- What strategies are you using to address factors in the Breeders Equation to make genetic gain?
- Are you using MateSel in your joining decisions to manage inbreeding/co-ancestry whilst making genetic gain?
- Are you planning to strategically genotype and young rams to increase selection accuracy and reduce generation interval?
- Do you have all data in Sheep Genetics and have checked available reports and exclusions?
- Have you checked percentile bands to see where you sit in comparison to industry?

NEW TOOLS AVAILABLE FOR SETTING A BREEDING OBJECTIVE AND TRACKING GENETIC GAIN

Setting a Breeding Objective is the first step to a successful sheep breeding business. Your Breeding Objective should capture key traits for the productivity and profitability of your business, as well as your client's businesses.



Sheep Genetics is asking for feedback on some recently developed resources to assist both seedstock and commercial producers in setting a Breeding Objective and tracking genetic gain. These resources can be found on the Sheep Genetics website via New tools for setting breeding objective and tracking genetic gain or the QR



MAKING GENETIC GAIN

The Breeders Equation describes how genetic progress is made. The factors influencing the rate of gain includes selection intensity, selection accuracy, generation interval, and genetic variation:

Genetic Gain (
$$\Delta G$$
) =
$$\frac{\text{Selection Intensity (i) x Selection Accuracy (r)}}{\text{Generation Interval (L)}} \times \text{Genetic Variation } (\sigma_G)$$

To make genetic gain, breeders can aim to increase selection intensity and, and/or decrease generation interval. There will be genetic variation in animals within your flock and the Terminal analysis which are available to make joining decisions. The Breeders Equation can be simplified even further to using animals with the best animals, selecting these with more accuracy, and using younger animals. As always, ASBVs should be used in a balanced approach when making joining decisions along with structural and health factors – if an animal cannot walk, eat, or reproduce it isn't going to be productive or profitable. There are several easy strategies that sheep breeders can use on-farm to address factors of the Breeders Equation to make genetic gain, including:



ORGANISING A DATA AUDIT WITH SHEEP GENETICS

Accurate ASBVs are a result of high quality, accurate data, hence it is important to ensure that data submitted to Sheep Genetics is quality. There are a number of data quality control steps in the analysis that identify potential data entry issues/exclude incorrect data – it is important to always ensure that you perform data validation in your on-farm software to limit any data entry mistakes. There are Sheep Genetics reports available to check the number of records being used in the analysis, data quality, and any exclusions including:

- Summary of traits observed per year drop
- Genomic pedigree inconsistencies
- Exclusions (both on submission and post-analysis)
- Data Quality Score (DQS) Report
- Reproduction summary

It's important to review these reports prior in advance to key events in your business, including ram sales and joining decisions to ensure high data quality and accurate ASBVs. Please contact Sheep Genetics to organise a data audit.

GENOTYPING YOUNG RAMS PRIOR TO JOINING TO BOOST ACCURACY OF ASBVS

Using young rams has the potential to increase your genetic gain through reducing your generation interval (see above strategies to improve genetic gain). However, young rams often have a lower ASBV accuracy due to less data informing ASBVs. Genotyping young rams can increase the selection accuracy (Breeders Equation).

It's important to consider timeframes when looking to strategically genotype young rams to help inform joining decisions. It can take up to 2 months from taking a tissue sampling unit (TSU) to genomic information being used to inform an animals ASBVs. Please be mindful to submit genotypes on young rams early to receive results back prior to making joining decisions. 


MATESEL

Sheep Genetics is currently running MateSel training and refresher workshops. MateSel is a free tool available to Sheep Genetics members which assists with joining decisions by identifying which rams and ewes to mate to get the best outcome per your Breeding Objective, whilst managing inbreeding/co-ancestry. MateSel uses pedigree and ASBVs from the Sheep Genetics database to inform decision making. There has been almost 5x more MateSel runs performed in 2022 compared to 2017 as significantly more Sheep Genetics members are now using MateSel to help inform selection and mating decisions.

In 2017, a flock in Sheep Genetics started using MateSel to help inform joining decisions. They have since been using MateSel each year to help with joining decisions, resulting in significant gain in their flock's average LEQ, which has surpassed both the breed and analysis average.




GENOTYPING WHITE SUFFOLK FLOCKS LEAD THE ANALYSIS FOR QUALITY DATA

The Data Quality Score (DQS) Report is available to Sheep Genetics members that have at least the last 3 years' worth of data in the analysis. The DQS uses the past 5 years' worth of data and considers factors such as completeness of pedigree, ratio of males to females, proportion of year drop with trait recording, number of contemporary groups, effective progeny numbers, linkage, and index gain.

A large proportion of White Suffolk flocks in Sheep Genetics have a data quality score of 4 or 5 (as per the 15/10/2023 analysis)! Flocks with a data quality score of 5, on average, make higher rates of genetic gain in comparison to flocks with low data quality scores, so it is important to focus on collecting high quality data to both improve your flocks' genetic merit as well as the genetic merit of your ram buyer clients. Of the 5-star flocks in the Terminal analysis, 49% are White Suffolk, 44% are Poll Dorset and the remaining 7% are made up of Suffolk, Texel, Ultra White, and Composite Terminal flocks.

MEET THE MCINDOE'S

Some of the McIndoe girls' earliest memories are in the shed.

They remember helping handle the magnificent White Suffolk rams under the patient guidance of their mum and dad.

And now these three incredible youngsters not only plan to grow their very own KIS White Suffolk stud in the future, they have another big goal in mind - beating their dad.

Isla, 14, Kirsty, 12, and Skye, 10, have been running their own stud alongside their parents Dugald and Bec McIndoe's Smithston Farms stud, based at Glencoe, since 2015.

They grew up being pushed in prams round the paddocks checking lambing ewes.

"We always used to go in the shed and help Dad with the rams, and sometimes when we put the halters on them and tried to lead them, they would be bolting around the yard," Skye said.

"We would get used to them and fiddle around with them, and we would quieten them down eventually."

You would think they just like White Suffolks because their parents have a stud, but there is much more to it than that.

"We like White Suffolks because of their temperament, they are nice bodied sheep, and they are the best overall," Kirsty said.

They began their KIS stud - named after their initials - with help from their parents.

"We were hanging around Dad's stud and he decided that it would be nice to get us three to start up a stud of our own," Isla said

"We have 65 stud ewes in KIS White Suffolks."

"They are the same type as Dad's sheep. Sometimes we use the same rams for our lambs, but ours are always better," Skye said.

The girls take great pride in working hard in their stud.

"We go outside at about 6:30am in the morning, and there are about 200 in the paddock at a time. And when we are really busy, sometimes there are 20 sheep that have lambed in the morning. They lamb outside and we bring them into the shed in the trailer. If it's a sunny day and they are single lambs, they will go back out that day. If they are twins, they will go out after one day if they are healthy. We tag, weigh and tail them before they go back out," Kirsty said.

The talented trio have some big plans for their KIS White Suffolk stud.

"Our plan is to get bigger and better than what Dad has," Isla said. "One day we're going to overrule Smithston."

Their dad Dugald McIndoe is pretty chuffed with his girls, and has loved working side-by-side with them since they were little.

"I had a ewe here when they were younger and I sprayed her with Condy's Crystals. Two little girls' faces just lit up when they saw the ewe go pink to begin with, and they thought that ewe was Christmas. That ewe went to Dubbo Show and they christened her 'Pink Lady'. We gave them 21 ewes for their stud, including Pink Lady, so they've still got the Pink Lady family," he said.

"They just love it. Before they go to school in the morning, they are out at daylight picking up lambs, putting them in pens and mothering them up. They do it every morning and then every night. We couldn't do it without them, to be honest."


EWE-TURN: A YEAR OF TWISTS AND TURNS IN THE SHEEP MARKET




Prices have plummeted to levels last witnessed back in 2016, and low clearance rates across the board have further exacerbated the situation for listings. White Suffolks, like all breeds, have borne the brunt of this market deterioration, experiencing returns at their lowest level since 2016 on AuctionsPlus. Supply in the third quarter of 2023 has also hit its lowest point since 2016. Clearance rates have not been immune to the declines, hovering around the 60% mark for most of the year; however, there is a glimmer of improvement as new season lambs come online. Currently, clearance for White Suffolk listings is averaging 74% for the fourth quarter.





Except for the first quarter of 2023, when a backlog of market-ready lambs pushed offerings to a Q1 record, this year has witnessed the lowest listing levels since prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. The typical new season lamb listing months from August to November have been considerably lower than average, as an unpredictable market has led sellers to rethink their strategies for finding buyers. Listings are beginning to pick up as we head towards Christmas, though it may be too little too late to compete against previous years.



To illustrate the rapid decline in prices throughout the year, White Suffolk prices have been indexed against the ESTLI (Eastern States Trade Lamb Indicator), starting at Q1 2016 as the reference quarter of 100. Over the following seven years, prices steadily rose against the first quarter of 2016, culminating in a peak in late 2021. However, prices then began to decline, and the severity of the fall was unforeseen. What took four years to build was wiped out in less than one, which is now currently resting below the indexed year.

As we run down the days to Christmas, November brings about a quieter month for AuctionsPlus, as the stud selling season winds down for another year. White Suffolk stud sales had a strong showing with 61 sales interfaced online this year. This is back from the peak of 2022 and just behind 2021 but is sitting above the remaining years. Considering the rapid decline in the commercial market, online statistics held up well, with the average online bids per lot sitting at 2, recording a slight decrease from previous years. Active bidders per sale were back to half of the high of 2020, with 4 — albeit representing a healthy number of buyers participating in each sale.

An interesting statistic is the average \$/head price across all White Suffolk sales, with online buyers coming in above the physical buyers at \$1,376/head against \$1,344/head, equating to a premium of \$33/head.



HONORARY LIFE MEMBERSHIP: PETER HEINRICH

One of the founding members of the White Suffolk breed has been presented with life membership of the Federal Association for his foresight more than 40 years ago and the impact his genetics have had on the breed.

Peter Heinrich, Ella Matta stud, Bute, who is 91 years of age, received the huge honour from long serving board member and family friend Andrew Frick during Royal Adelaide Show judging.

Peter says he never set out to be a stud breeder but it came about trying to maintain the merits of the Suffolk breed while also breeding a sheep with a white face and white points.

"We had to get the black fibres out to get more for the wool and skins, the meat buyers used to come along and not want any black points and discount the lambs," he said.

To do this he bought a ram from the Kentish Downs stud at the prestigious SA Poll Dorset Fair and put it over some Burwood Suffolk ewes.

About the same time a number of other breeders also had the same idea but when the flock book was established in 1979 Ella Matta was given the number one stud.

Mr Frick said Peter had been a tremendous support to fellow breeders including himself recalling the time when he got to help prepare and show a team for Ella Matta when the White Suffolks made their Adelaide Show debut that same year.

"Peter had a wonderful group of rams, it may have been the only time that Ella Matta has shown but they showed with some success that day," he said.

Another of Peter's highlights was when a ram exhibited by the Pipkorn family, Detpa Grove stud which was bred from an Ella Matta ram won Grand Champion at Adelaide a while ago.

In the early years Ella Matta sold many high priced rams at the SA Foundation Breeders sale as well as privately.

In 2000 Peter handed over the stud to his son Andrew and his wife Tracie which saw the stud relocated from the Yorke Peninsula to Kangaroo Island.

Third generation Jamie Heinrich is also a big part of the Ella Matta stud which now comprises about 700 stud White Suffolk ewes and holds an annual on-property sale which has seen several state records over the years.

"They are a wonderful group of stud breeders in the White Suffolks and I think the breed is still right up there," Peter said.





FRIENDSHIPS, FORTS & FEEDING

For Imogen and Oscar Cameron, every day involves sheep.

And for these up-and-coming sheep breeders, running White Suffolks isn't just about the impressive breed - it's also about the friendships.



Imogen, 12, and Oscar, 10, have been helping their parents Dean and Mandy Cameron with their Noremac White Suffolk and Suffolk studs, based at Englefield, ever since they can remember.

"I remember racing Dad into the wool shed to get the grain and hay before he did so I could feed the rams," Imogen said.

"I would pick one or two rams, and they would be mine. No one else was allowed to show or halter that ram. From my perspective, as a young kid I remember picking all the best rams."

Imogen is very involved in showing the sheep and getting them ready for sale, including taking photos and updating Facebook.

Meanwhile Oscar is very involved in the hands-on work on the farm.

"I drive the four-wheeler or the side-by-side to muster sheep, without a dog," he said.

"I like working with the sheep. I think White Suffolks are one of the calmest sheep breeds out there. They are really easy to work in the yards, they don't jump the fences."

Their favourite time of year is lambing. "With natural mating, Ocky and I do a lot of that," Imogen said.

"We tag and weigh the lambs at birth, and record who the mother is, who the father is, and whether they are a ram or a ewe.

"We also record if they have been born as a triplet, a twin or a single. We also record their rear type. We have arguments over who is tagging the next lamb."

The kids have already got their futures planned - Oscar is going to take on the White Suffolk stud and Southdowns, meanwhile Imogen will be running the Suffolks and the family's Shorthorn herd. Imogen also plans to become a vet and have a wildlife sanctuary.

RAMS

Masculine in appearance, displaying a strong carcase on good structure.

EWES

Showing great femininity, with sound udder formation.

HEAD & EARS

Free of wool from the ears forward, sound mouth & bottom jaw, little to no colour, pigmentation of eyes & nostrils accepted & encouraged. Large ears, thick & not erect.

Muzzle maybe slightly convex, no horns or scurs present.

NECK & SHOULDERS

A moderate neck flowing into a smooth shoulder setting with limited blade movement when walking.

BACK & LOIN

A straight top line, firm with well sprung ribs & a wide deep loin.

TAIL SETTING

Well set up just below the level of the spine.

HIND QUARTERS

Full wide & deep with heavily muscled thighs.

CARCASE

Heavy, carry from front to back in a slight wedge shape.

LEGS & FEET

Legs well placed at the four quarters & free moving, free of wool from the knees & hocks, strong bone, compact straight hoofs (not splayed), with erect pasterns that still have some forgiveness.

SKIN

Pink in colour & free of pigment.

WOOL

Fine 'downs' type, dense & free of kemp, medullated & coloured fibres.

TESTICLES

Testicles even, firm & moderate in size.
